# Anderson, Freeman in Race for Governor

The contest for governor promises to be one of the tightest, and certainly one of the most interesting, in next Tuesday's election.

What some observers have called a "Democratic trend" has brightened the hopes of the DFL nominee Orville Freeman and convinced the Republican incumbent, Gov. C. Elmer Anderson, that he has a race on his hands.

A third candidate, Ross Schelin, former St. Louis county farmer, filed by nominating petition after Sept. 14 primary election. A Socialist Labor party member, Schelin will appear on the ballot as the Industrial Government candidate. The change of party name was necessitated by a Minnesota law which forbids two parties to use part of the same name on the ballot (the word "Labor" is set aside for the exclusive use of the Democratic - Farmer - Labor party).

Anderson's statement:
"The principal reason for asking the people of Minnesota to elect me to a second full term as their governor is the desire to continue those programs and projects which have been launched and developed under my administration and those of my predecessors.

"These programs of good for the public are all making progress. Disrupting them now with a change in administration and philosophy could jeopardize that progress. With experience secured over a period of years, the personnel of my administration are especially well equipped to carry the various programs toward their objective.

"After three years as governor, I am convinced that experience in a lesser position of government and in the world of business are valuable in the work of heading a state administration, where a thorough understanding of the intricacies of state government and the possibilities of adapting the efficient methods of business are of major importance. ## Governor's Duties

The governor, elected to a two-year term, is Minnesota's chief executive officer and commander of the state's military forces. He serves as ex-officio member of the pardon board, executive council, investment board and various other agencies.

The governor appoints the heads of state departments and fills a number of other offices by appointment. He passes upon bills voted by the legislature and has the right of veto. He may call special legislative sessions, but rarely does so ..

The governor's salary is \$15,000. He also is allowed \$7,000 annually for personal expenses connected with his

# Rolvaag vs. Peterson for Lt. Governor

Two former Minnesota chair men of their respective political parties are competing for the office of lieutenant governor.

They are Karl F. Rolvaag, Rochester, Democratic-Farmer-Laborite, and P. Kenneth Peterson, Republican, Minneapolis.

One of them will succeed Donald O. Wright, Minneapolis attorney, who was sworn in as lieutenant governor two months ago because, as president pro tempore of the state senate, he was in line for the job when Ancher Nelsen resigned to become rural electrification administrator. Wright is unopposed for re-election to his senate post from the 30th legislative district.

The lieutenant governor presides over the Minnesota state senate but does not have a vote. He becomes governor if a vacancy occurs.

He is elected for a two-year term and is paid \$3,000 a year. He has an expense allowance of \$500 annually.

ernor must have an intimate knowledge of the workings of our legislature because he is the presiding officer of the state senate. My eight years of service as a member of the legislature has given me that experience. As chairman of the civil administration committee for the past four years I have gained an insight into the basic problems that confront Minne-

"Knowledge of parliamentary procedure is prerequisite to the administration of this office. I have had the experience of presiding over the house on numerous occasions.

"The public also should know the kind of legislation with which the lieutenant governor would be identified. I have introduced and succeeded in having enacted into law such important legislation as our state civil defense law, Minnesota narcotic act, presidential primary and the dependents support act for abandoned families. In addition, I have been a member of the Council of State Governments since 1947, during which time I have had the opportunity to know the problems and accomplishments of other states, and on three occasions have addressed their regional and national assemblies on matters of state legislation.

Rolvaag's statement: "It is my opinion that I should be elected to the office of lieutenant governor for a whole host of reasons. Very briefly, some of these reasons

"1. I am opposed to a retail sales tax in the state while my Republican opponent voted for the introduction of a sales tax while he was a member of the Minnesota house of representatives. The Democratic-Farmer-Labor party is strongly opposed to a general retail sales tax. The Republican party and its leadership has not opposed a sales tax. Most of its leaders have announced in favor of a sales tax.

"2. The state government is urgently in need of reorganization. For years the Republicans have demonstrated clearly they do not intend to do anything about the reorganization along the lines of the "Little Hoover report." This report has now been before the Republican state administration since 1951. So far nothing has been done. My opponent, as chairman of the house committee on civil administration, has killed several measures based on the Little Hoover report.

"3. The Republican administration has proved that it is not able to handle the complex week brings to light new evidences of inefficiency, corruption, missing funds and bad administration.

"4. The Republican party and its candidates are too satisfied with the status quo. In 1954 the ideas and practices that were successful in 1939 no longer meet the situation. They offer no hope for the future and no solutions to the problems of today.

# **Voters to Decide** on 6-Mill City School Tax Hike

Minneapolis voters will be asked to indicate next Tuesday on the lavender-striped ballot-whether they wish to authorize the board of education to levy an additional tax of up to six mills for school purposes.

The board at present has power to levy 33.74 mills (a mill is one-tenth of a cent) on each dollar of assessed valua-

The issue is approval or disapproval of amendment No. 13 to the Minneapolis city charter. Sixty per cent of those voting on the issue must vote "yes" if the amendment is to

The board of education says it needs the additional taxing power to pay anticipated increased costs of operation for the next three years. It will levy only 4.25 mills for 1955, but it expects by 1957, because of increasing enrollment, to need six mills.

The board of estimate and taxation says the amendment would bring an additional .75 mill when homestead exemption values are added to the tax base. The resulting 6.75 mills would produce a return of \$2,367,935 based on current

Revenue from a 4.25 mill levy, based on 98 per cent collection, would be \$1,461,105.

The additional levy will not be used for new construction or major rehabilitation. It can be used only for current operating expenses—pay increases for teachers and civil service workers, driver training in the high schools and additional teachers to reduce class size.

The board of directors of the Citizens League of Greater Minneapolis, in supporting the proposed charter amendment, pointed out that class size bears directly on quality of education and in order to attract and keep an excellent faculty, the city should be in the first 25 per cent of cities over 200,000 nonulation, is its sent the is on the lower edge of the first 50 per cent and is below average in ratio of supervisory salaries to teachers' salaries.

### Treasurer Duties

Principal function of the county treasurer is collection of taxes. He is the "banker" for county, village and township governments.

The treasurer — elected to a four-year term at an annual salary of \$8,500—is in charge of securities deposited in county depositories. He makes out tax statements, cares for sinking fund bonds and collects taxes for the state, county, city and for rural school districts and towns and villages outside Minneapolis. He pays out money on warrants issued by the auditor, settles and apportions current and mortgage registry taxes, supervises opening of safety boxes of deceased persons and attends appraisals of their estates.

# Who's Who of Candidates for 1955 Legislative Seats

Names of nominees in 25 contests and 2 single-candidate elections will appear Tuesday on election ballots in the nine Minnesota legislative districts of Hennepin county.

Two veteran state senators will be re-elected without opposition. They are Donald O. Wright, 30th district, and Gerald T. Mullin, 35th.

Seven incumbent senators face competition for seats in the 1955 legislative session. There will be contests also for all 18 county seats in the house of representatives.

The nine districts have one senate seat each to be filled in this election. Eight districts-28th through 35th-have two seats each in the house. The 36th district also has two seats, but they are split, one apiece, into north and south halves of the district.

Biographical information on the candidates and their own statements of qualifications were obtained by the Citizens League of Greater Minneapolis.





## **Duties of State** Legislators

The Minnesota senate has 67 members, one from each of the state's 67 legislative districts. The house of representatives has 131 members. The two bodies write laws of the state. Representatives are elected

for two-year terms, senators for four-year terms.

The legislature meets every two years for a session of 90 working days—approximately four calendar months. Members are paid \$3,000 for each two-year period.
